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刊行にあたって

本書は、横浜国立大学附属図書館所蔵の「カール・S・シャウプ・コレクション」の一部を書籍化したものである。カール・S・シャウプ・コレクション(以下、シャウプ・コレクション)とは、「シャウプ勧告(またはシャウプ使節団)」で知られるアメリカの経済学者カール・S・シャウプ博士(Carl S. Shoup, 1902-2000)が遺した膨大な資料群である。

シャウプは晩年、その資料群を日本の研究機関にに託すことを希望し、縁あって 1990年代初頭、横浜国立大学が受託した。この度、酸性紙の劣化著しい当該の資料について、こうして書籍の形態として提供できる運びとなったことは大いに喜びである。

国内ではシャウプは、もっぱら戦後日本の税制に関わるいわゆるシャウプ税制使節団として知られている。むろんこの面において当コレクションはその歴史的諸相に迫ることと並んで、今日の日本の租税国家としての基盤を考え直していくうえでも重要な資料群である。それとともに、当該資料は、20世紀アメリカの財政学の系譜として、そしてまたアメリカからの財政構想の発信としても、重要な意義をもつである。

もともとシャウプは、米国コロンビア大学のエドウィン・セリグマン、ロバート・ヘイグらの系譜に属する財政学者である。この系譜は 20 世紀初頭から半ばにかけての米国の財政政策や税制の整備に強い影響力を持ち、彼らの実証主義や実践性に裏打ちされた税務調査・研究は国内外で高い評価を受けていた。シャウプは、1920 年代末からセリグマンやヘイグと共に国内外の租税調査に同行し、当該国または当該地域の租税制度に関する勧告を行ってきた。

1930 年代以来、キューバ、ベネズエラなどの調査を展開し、大都市ニューヨークの税制にも勧告を行い、さらに 1960 年代の初頭

の EC におけるノイマルク委員会にも加わった というシャウプの軌跡は、今後さまざまな関 心のもとに照らし出されることであろう。

報告書草稿群や往復書簡の大半は英文であり、アメリカなどの海外研究者から関心を寄せられている。そこでこの度、アメリカ財政史研究の泰斗エリオット・ブラウンリー教授(W. Elliot Brownlee: University of California, Santa Barbara)の協力を得ながら、邦文および英文の解題を適宜付して、刊行することにした。

便宜上日本関係、米国関係、その他諸外国 関係の3部から構成して編纂刊行を進めるも のであるが、これらを横断的総合的に活用され、 新たな知見が育まれることを願うものである。



Structure of the line-up of the J-Series

During the publication of this J-Series, the arrangement has developed in some points from the original announcement in the volume 1. This is partly occurred by the gradual investigation of the materials of Carl S. Shoup Collection, still now in progress. This supplement is to show the new structure of the fifteen volumes accomplished.

[A] Transactions and Memoranda (mainly volumes 1-6)

Volume 1: Transactions and Memoranda I Volume 2: Transactions and Memoranda II Volume 3: Transactions and Memoranda III Volume 4: Transactions and Memoranda IV Volume 5: Transactions and Memoranda V Volume 6: Transactions and Memoranda VI

The materials of volume 1 to volume 6 provide how the socalled Shoup mission to Japan worked. Some items in other volumes are good to be utilised under the combination of this frame.

As described in the textual introduction to the volume 1,this category of Transactions and Memoranda is composed from four parts.

[PART I] Communications with the Section of GHQ/SCAP [PART II] Formation and Procedures for the Mission to Japan [PART III] Transactions with Individuals in US side [PART IV] Transactions with Japanese Sectors and Individuals.

[B] Reception and Responses to the activities and report of the Mission in Japan (volumes 7-8)

Volume 7: The Mission Report in Progress and After Volume 8: The responses of Japanese side to the Shoup Mission's recommendation

During the activities of the Mission in 1949 and in 1950, it brought many responses in variety of Japanese sectors. Volume 7 provides how the Mission and GHQ side tried to grasp the Japanese situation on this point. Volume 8 contains the materials how the Japanese side made the responses as those style of petitions, and via the public opinion research managed by some Japanese agency.

[C] Formation of the Local Finance and Local Taxation scheme after the Mission Report (volumes 9-10)

Volume 9: Local Finance / Local Taxation I Volume 10: Local Finance / Local Taxation II

After the Mission Report on September 1949, the topics of local administration revealed a kind of symbolic one in bringing the new management of finance and taxation. On December 1949, the Local Administration Investigation Committee was enacted, and some intensive discussion worked among Japanese Sectors. Volume 9 provides how the sources of these Japanese side were grasped by the Mission and GHQ side in English translation. Volume 10 includes the materials how the staff of Mission-GHQ

side pursued the situation of discussion among Japanese sectors, and some research materials or proposals from both sides of US and Japan.

[D] Coordinating the Scheme of Taxation in Japan (volumes 11-12)

Volume 11: Coordinating the Scheme of Taxation in Japan I Volume 12: Coordinating the Scheme of Taxation in Japan II

Adding to the local financial and taxation scheme, Japanese side engaged in formation of the new scheme or in reforming the existing scheme of taxation. The volumes of 11 and 12 deals with the idea and plan on these point, including the major tasks of promotion of Taxation Bureau. The discussions include the taxation of variety of items, including the highlight of the one on liquor tax.

Tax Bureau of Ministry of Finance arranged the document for this in Japanese by mimeograph printing. J-Series provide the reproduction of this based on the ones under the possession of Carl S. Shoup Collection.

Following to the so-called first Shoup's Mission, the Japan Tax Association was organised. Saburo Shiomi made the communication with Shoup on this Association. Adding to this, Shiomi got much support by Shoup on his idea of publication of Japan's Finance and Taxation.

After the publication of the Mission report, sectors of ESS, GHQ tried to grasp how the components of Mission Report to be adapted among Japanese reform scheme of taxation.

Textual Introduction

This volume contains reports and materials (including drafts) concerning the Japan's local administration and tax system during the GHQ (General Headquarters) occupation period.

The first two reports were prepared by the Local Administration Investigation Committee, which was established on December 24, 1949, in response to Shoup Recommendation.¹ This Committee was established based on the Act Establishing the Local Administration Investigation Committee (Act No. 281 of 1949), but, unlike traditional councils, became the highly independent organization just like Science Council of Japan, due to the strong request from the GHQ.

Its chairman was Dr. Masao Kambe, a former mayor of Kyoto, a former member of Local Finance Commission, and professor of Kyoto University. Under SCAP auspices, three of the five members of the committee undertook a journey to the United States and the United Kingdom to inspect local administration there. Then the group settles down to do a prodigious amount of careful and painstaking work. These are the following two reports...... (Norikazu Chihara)

Textual Introduction

(1) Materials relative to local finance / local taxation in I-Series

he Carl S. Shoup Collection, possessed by the library of Yokohama National University, includes some amount of documents relative to the discussions and formation of the Japanese scheme of local finance and local taxation during the years of 1949 - 1951. The volumes 9 and 10 treat the related items based on the boxes 357-364 of this collection.

IIn accepting the report of the so-called first Shoup's mission to Japan, the law of establishing the "Local Administration Investigation Committee" was enacted on December 24, 1949. It was a part of reforming scheme of local administration under the suggestion by GHQ. The committee was designed to be the organ under the government of Japan. During the next year 1950, the members of committee, solely composed by Japanese, promoted their activities, of which Masao Kambe took the role of the chair. Later, in taking the surname of the chair person, the report of the committee on December 22, 1950 was casually called with the label of "Kambe Report," or "Kambe Recommendation."

Meanwhile, some staffs on the side of GHQ contacted with Carl S. Shoup often. Harold C. Bradshaw and Henry Shavell were the major two figures who communicated with Shoup intensively. They reported to him on the situation of the discussion among administrative and political spheres in Tokyo with attaching many documents and memoranda. Sometimes, they sent the message to Shoup with a few lines of a kind of anxiety in saying that the discussion or decision in Parliament seemed to be going

into other directions or results than they had expected.

In this J-Series, volume 9 includes mostly official documents. Items 1 and 2 are the draft and the report of the Local Administration Investigation Committee in English version. The items 3 and 4 are the documents of legal arrangement, namely the drafts for the "partial amendment to the local tax law." On the first page, in upper-right part, of each of these items, there are indicated as the "Government Draft No.1" and "Government Draft No.2" in handwriting, presumably by some other person than Shoup. 1

Volume 10, namely this volume, covers those documents of more practical but intensive communications, reports of research, and the materials or opinions from the Japanese sectors. The first two items 1 and 2 are the communications from Harold C. Bradshaw to Shoup, and between Henry Shavell and Shoup. In many cases, these materials have the co-enveloped documents. For the purpose of reproducing the enveloped items, this volume indicates each of the transactions by the code of [Doc. Numbers]. In this way, it is shown how and when Shoup received envelopes with, in many cases, co-enveloped documents.

Textual Introduction to the volume 11 & 12, J-Series

(1) Materials relative to J-Series in Carl S. Shoup Collection, and the components of the volumes of 11 and 12

The Carl S. Shoup Collection, possessed by the Library of Yokohama National University, includes huge amount of documents relative to discussions and practical arrangements of the (re)formation of Japanese scheme of taxation, especially linked with the so-called Shoup's Mission to Japan on the years of 1949 and of 1950. The volumes 11 and 12 treat the related items, mainly based on the boxes 359-361 of this collection. The focus in the volumes 11 and 12 is how some of Japanese public sectors formulated the idea and plan of reforming taxation, mainly those produced by the Taxation Bureau.

In relation to these two volumes, volumes 9 and 10 of J-Series include those documents relative to the formation of the plan of local finance and local taxation especially in the style of legislation. Volumes 13 and 14 will include variety types of materials, as those some responses to the Mission Reports on 1949 and 1950, the petitions to the Mission or to Carl S. Shoup himself from various Japanese agencies, records of nationwide research of public opinion, some drafts and records of academic

discussions, and so on. A set of the transactions between Carl S. Shoup and Sumio Hara is to be provided in volume 2, which has very close connection with some items in these two volumes of 11 and 12.

As the producers of the materials provided here in these two volumes are those of the side of Japan, items were in many cases translations of the documents originally produced in Japanese. However, in some cases, communication seems to have occurred directly written in English, especially in the case of communication and exchange of ideas between some sectors or persons of Japanese side and the members of Mission or the staffs of some section of GHQ. So, the researchers may check the items with references to, or in comparison with, the items written in Japanese. The latter ones might be found especially from those materials now under the possession of the National Archives of Japan, et al.

(1) The components of volume 13 and 14

Volume 13 and 14 contain the following books: "The Collection of Materials Submitted to Shoup Tax Mission in FY1949, Vol.1-3, 1" and "The Collection of Materials Submitted to Shoup Tax Mission in FY1950, Vol.3 (statistics). 2" These books are compiling internal documents that the Tax Bureau of Ministry of Finance drew up from March to July in response to a strong request by the U.S. side. The leading members of Finance Ministry bureaucrats involved in actual preparation and organization of materials were Keiichiro Hirata (Director-General of the Tax Bureau at that time, later the Administrative Vice Finance Minister), Saichi Chū (Director of Research Division at the Tax Bureau at that time, later Professor at the Nihon University, College of Commerce) and Minomatsu Izumi (Director of the Ad Hoc Tax Research Office of the Tax Bureau at that time, later the Commissioner of the National Tax Agency)³.

Textual Introduction

This volume 15 is the final one of the line-up of J-Series, The Carl S. Shoup's Materials of Public Finance and Taxation. It is composed from three elements.

At the beginning, this volume contains the general information of the Carl S. Shoup Collection, which is maintained by the Library of Yokohama National University. This volume also provides the textual introduction in general to the A-Series, already published in twenty volumes.

The Part One provides the documents relative to the earlier activities of Japan Tax Association. It is mainly the information from Saburo Shiomi to Carl S. Shoup. In this part, the materials on the formation of Shiomi's volume entitled as Japan's Finance and Taxation is also contained.

The Part Two is on the materials of some Japanese groups who had the chance to visit US for the purpose of exploring the American condition of public finance and taxation in 1950 - 1951.

At last, under the frame of supplement, the structure of J-Series is explained. The textual introduction for the volumes 2, 7, 11 and 12 are also added.

Structure of the line-up of the A-Series

Although the full of A-Series, 20 volumes, had been published, the editorial committee failed to arrange the textual introduction for each volume. This lack was under the tight schedule of the publication. We the editorial committee apologize this inconvenience of information to all the possible readers, and to the libraries related. In order to fill this gap, the description below provides the outline of the textual basis of the full scale of A-Series.

Among the huge materials of the Carl S. Shoup Collection described in the outline on previous pages of this volume, the A-Series utilize the materials of the box and following.

* * *

The materials of these boxes are basically arranged based on the names of persons, who exchanged the communication with Carl S. Shoup. This classification of folder names is based on the way of Carl S. Shoup himself. In case a folder lacked its name, the previous research group from the 1990s to 2003 followed the same way. The materials are arranged by the initial letters of personal names subsequently.

However, many documents of the collection remained untidy in various boxes without any systematic categories. The new members of the research since 2009 made the careful examination of these. Under this procedure, many sheets were put into the exact folder into the boxes of these numbers.

* * *

The twenty volumes of the A-Series took the same way of arrangement, namely in alphabetical by personal names. The readers may identify the background of most of the documents by checking the letterheads of institutions, companies, etc.

In many cases of the whole materials of the Collection, Carl S. Shoup arranged the documents and correspondences of some categories or initials in some folders in the inverse date order. For this reason, much of the materials in boxes 380 and following are arranged in the inverse sequence of the dates. To avoid the complex procedure of the editing, and especially to reduce the burden of the procedure by the publisher, this A-Series basically keeps the original arrangements of the sheets.

* * *

Among the communication materials, there are many documents which treated personal issues. For example, Carl S. Shoup was asked to make some review on the previous students on the occasion of their chance of position. Since the earlier career at Columbia University as an assistant professor, Carl S. Shoup had taken the role of the editor of a journal, and there were some exchanges of possible subscription of the papers to the journal. In these cases, namely the referee for the job opportunities, or the unsuccessful application of the papers to the journal etc, the materials are not included into the volumes of the A-Series.

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Structure of the line-up of the W-Series

The publication project of the Carl S. Shoup Collection at Yokohama National University is composed of three series: J-Series, A-Series and W-Series. The J-Series covers the materials relative to the so-called Carl S. Shoup Mission of Taxation to Japan in the years of 1949 and 1950. The A-Series is arranged to treat the correspondences of Carl S. Shoup with some public and private sectors in the United States, and with individuals mostly based on American institutions. The coverage of the materials is roughly from 1930 to early 1950s.

In addition to these research, Carl S. Shoup took part in a series of research to examine the tax systems of foreign nations. The first research abroad was implemented in Cuba in the 1930s, firstly with Edwin R. A. Seligman and secondly by himself. After the research in Japan in the years of 1949 and 1950, he also participated in the research on Venezuela, Brazil, etc. Furthermore, he was engaged in the research and communication related to tax issues of the European Economic Community (EEC) in the 1960s and 1970s. Among his world-wide research activities, the W-Series contains the materials related to the tax research of EEC (Volume 1 and 2), and the Cuba research (Volume 3 to 6).

Volume 1 and 2 contain the materials related to the European Economic Community. Volume 1 is composed of the materials from Box 251 and Box 011, which deal with the comments and communication on the EEC reports. Volume 2 focuses on intensive communication with Fritz Neumark from the mid-1950s to the early 1970s, utilizing the materials from Box 117. Volume 3 to 6 contain correspondence, interviews and other memoranda related to the Cuba research, utilizing the materials from Box 315 and Box 316.

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Part II to Part XIII contain the materials from Folder 36 to 42 of Box 011, which are mainly composed of the comments by Professor Shoup on the reports by the Fiscal and Financial Committee (Comité Fiscal et Financier) of the European Economic Community (Communaté Economique Européenne), including the committee's drafts in the French texts.

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This volume is composed of materials in the Box 316 "Cuba" of the Carl S. Shoup Collection and contains materials in Folder 012 "Interviews and Other Memorandums, 1931-32 (the first mission)" of this Box. Part I mainly includes materials regarding the memorandums of interviews with Cuban officials, Cuban university researchers, and representatives of leading corporations when Shoup visited Cuba in the 1930s to conduct field investigations for gathering views on modifying the fiscal system. Part II contains materials Shoup seemed to obtain and receive during or before these two field surveys
